

Keeping Politics Out of Your Community Association, by Donna

Not surprisingly, the chatter about whether or not political signs should be permitted in private residential communities has increased as we draw closer to the elections in November.

Let's first discuss whether or not an owner in a Florida HOA (COA) has the "right" to install signs. The short answer is "no" with one exception. FL homeowners' associations can prohibit all types of signs other than one security sign located ten or fewer feet from the entrance to the home. All other signs including "For Sale" signs, signs installed by vendors doing work at a home, seasonal and congratulatory greetings and political signage may be prohibited IF the board determines that doing so is in the best interests of the community. Naturally, if the members disagree with their board's decisions they may decide not to reelect that board in the future.

Some owner signs enhance a community's charm including seasonal greetings, and in the time of Covid, the congratulatory yard signs letting neighbors know of a child's accomplishments when a traditional party could not take place. However, other signs cause concern. Many boards dislike the posting of "For Sale" signs as an abundance of those signs may send the wrong signal to both residents and potential purchasers.

And, it goes without saying that political signs these days are capable of igniting deep fractions inside residential communities. One school of thought is that some people's sensitivities should not dictate others' ability to promote their political candidate of choice.

The other school of thought associated with political signs is that they do not belong inside a private residential community where they can do more harm than good. The advocates for keeping politics out of communities believe that one's political ideology is more productively expressed through monetary donations, volunteering for a campaign and/or waging war on social media sites to one's heart's content.

Some owners maintain that their constitutional rights are being trampled if their association denies them the right to install a political sign or political flag. In fact, you need a state actor to be the entity violating one's First Amendment rights in order to mount a sound constitutional argument. In Florida, condos and HOAs have not been found to be state actors so prohibiting political signs and political flags is possible either through a recorded covenant or a board rule if the board has rule-making authority under the governing documents. In the case of Quail Creek Prop. Owners Association, Inc. v. Hunter, 538 So. 2d 1288, 1289 (Fla. 2nd DCA 1989), the Second District Court of Appeal found that an association's sign restriction was not unconstitutional as "neither the recording of the protective covenant in the public records, nor the possible enforcement of the covenant in the courts of the state, constitutes sufficient "state action" to render the parties' purely private contracts relating to the ownership of real property unconstitutional."

Some boards choose to regulate the number and size of political signs and flags and how long they can remain in place, however, when it comes to wording on those signs and what may or may not be considered offensive that requires a more in-depth analysis which some boards understandably wish to avoid. After much debate, many communities simply decide that political signs are best left outside their communities.

The place you call home should be a respite from the world and respites often don't involve contentious political signage next door.

FROM THE COMMUNICATIONS TEAM:

When to Call 911 in an emergency:

If you encounter a criminal act, call 911 immediately. The police need to catch the perpetrators in the act to take swift and effective action. A ring camera or video will assist the police in this situation.

You should call in situations when there is an immediate threat to life or property, or medical response is required.

When to in a non-emergency:

You should call the non-emergency number in situations where immediate police, fire, or medical response is not required. Some examples include:

- Reporting a crime that occurred earlier and does not pose a current danger (e.g., vandalism, theft).
- Noise complaints, such as loud parties or barking dogs.
- Reporting suspicious activity that is not currently happening.
- Non-urgent welfare checks on individuals.
- Reporting lost property.
- Animal Control Violation in addition to Code Compliance

Calling 911 is for emergencies when there is an immediate threat to life or property, while the non-emergency number is for situations that require police attention but are not urgent.

When to Call the City of Clearwater Code Compliance

You should call Code Compliance in the following situations:

- Property Maintenance Issues: If you notice a property that is poorly maintained, such as overgrown lawns, dilapidated structures, or accumulation of trash and debris.
- Zoning Violations: For issues related to illegal land use, such as operating a business in a residential zone or unauthorized building modifications.
- Illegal Dumping: When someone is dumping waste or hazardous materials on public or private property.
- Noise Complaints: For ongoing noise issues that violate local ordinances but are not an immediate threat (e.g., loud music or construction noise outside of permitted hours).
- Parking Violations: When vehicles are parked illegally on residential streets or in areas where they are not permitted.
- Animal Control Violations: Such as excessive barking, animals not on leashes, or other issues
 related to the care and control of pets.
- Signage Violations: For signs that are improperly placed, too large, or otherwise not in compliance with local regulations.
- Unsafe Living Conditions: If you observe conditions that may be unsafe for occupants, such as exposed wiring, lack of running water, or other issues that may pose health and safety risks.

If you encounter any of these issues, you should contact your local Code Compliance department to report them. They will investigate and take the necessary actions to resolve the problem.

When to report overstayed visitors to the Board:

Visitors may stay for 3 weeks for every 6 months

If you have a visitor who will be staying longer than the stipulated time, they must be vetted in the office and pay \$40.00 for a background check.

If the visitor has an overstayed stay and does not report to the office, the property owner will receive a warning from the Property Manager.

The timeline for Compliance is posted on the Bulletin Board, after the period allowed, the owner will receive a letter from the attorney to have the visitor vacate the premises or face eviction.

Please, help the association, your neighbors, and residents to keep Mission Hills safe and avoid unnecessary expenditures.

LAUNDRY ROOM CHANGES

We are streamlining the laundry room operations to improve efficiency and service. Ken will soon be taking charge of the laundry room, and some other improvements are on the way. We'll need everyone's cooperation to implement these changes effectively. If you notice a washing machine or dryer that isn't working, please submit a work order. If you know which specific unit is broken, include that information in the work order—this will help speed up the repair process.

BON APPETITE FOR SEPTEMBER

Here is a quick and easy dish that is also served at O'Keefe's in downtown Clearwater a nice change and can be used at any of our Pot Luck social events ... yum!!!!

Kentucky Hot Brown Bake

Servings: 9 servings

Ingredients

8 oz package refrigerated crescent rolls


1 lb. package smoked turkey lunch meat

8 slices cooked bacon

8 slices Swiss cheese

3 Roma tomatoes sliced thin

4 eggs beaten



Instructions

Unroll the crescent dough and separate into 2 squares.

Place one square in bottom of 8" pan that is greased or lined with parchment paper.

Press dough to fit pan.

Layer with half the turkey, bacon, cheese and tomatoes.

Pour half the eggs over the top.

Repeat the layers.

Top with remaining dough square.

Pour remaining eggs over top.

Bake at 350 for 20 minutes, covered with foil. Remove foil and bake another 20-25 minutes.

Let sit at room temp for 15-20 minutes before serving.

Notes

This recipe is adapted from Mr. Food's Italian Layer Bake. You will need about an hour total to bake and let it set after baking.





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What if my pet bites/swallows a cane toad?

Pets that bite or consume a cane toad can become sick and die in as little as 15 minutes without proper treatment, according to FWC. Cane toads release a milky toxin in defense that can stick to a pet's mouth.

Common symptoms in pets affected by this toxin include frantic or disoriented behavior, brick-red gums, seizures and foaming of the mouth. FWC says pet owners should follow these steps if their pet is showing these symptoms:

- Wash toxins forward out of the mouth using a hose for ten minutes being careful not to direct water down the throat.
- Wipe gums/tongue with a dish towel to remove toxins
- · Get your pet to the vet!

How do I remove them from my property?

To safely remove cane toads, FWC says residents looking to handle them should wear eye and skin protection and latex, rubber, or nitrile gloves. Those who need help can hire a wildlife trapper.

Residents should follow these steps to keep cane loads off their property, according to FWC:

- · Cut your grass regularly and keep it short
- · Fill in any holes around structures
- · Trim the underside of shrubs
- · Keep branches or riprap off the ground
- · Clear away brush piles
- Remove clutter

Here's how to protect your pets from cane toads this summer in Florida

An invasive species, cane toads are poisonous to most animals that try to bite or consume them, according to FWC.

Where did they come from?

Cane toads are nonnative to Florida, according to FWC. They originated from the Amazon basin in South America and north to the Rio Grande Valley in Southern Texas.

FWC said cane toads were first introduced to the Sunshine State to control agricultural pests in sugar cane in the 1930s and 1940s. Current populations are reportedly believed to be linked to escapes and releases by importers in the 1950s and 1960s.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — In Florida, summer doesn't only mean humid temperatures and tropical storms. It also means an influx of an invasive frog species known as cane toads.

Most active during the summer months, cane toads are commonly found in yards, around buildings or near canals and ponds in the Sunshine State, according to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC).

What if I come into contact with a cane toad?

My name is Tina Hans and I've lived in our community 15 years! It's an old community, but I fell in love right from the start. Because of the age of our community, we have seen increases in our COA fees and have had to come up with some assessments, as well. My concern is for some homeowners that just can't pay the fees. They've been residents here for many years and now can no longer afford to live here. And they have no place to go.

Some of us can afford an extra \$20 per month. We have 477 units here. If 100 of us would contribute \$20 per month, that would be \$2,000 a month and would go a long way to take care of neighbors that may be in danger of losing their homes.

There is a white lockbox on the wall outside the office. Can you put \$20 a month in there? It would be completely anonymous. I will work with Ameritech to see that the money goes to the right place. I've already put my \$20 in and will do so every month. I don't want to see our neighbors out on the streets. Can we be good neighbors and help them out? Thanks so much!

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
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Pickleball Anyone?


Anyone else have that idea?
